Explanation of Tonight's Service

Tonight's theme is straight-forward. Two thousand years ago the Creator of this world took on human flesh to die for the sins of the very people he created. Those who believe in Jesus as their Savior will never face eternal punishment for their sins; they have eternal life. God's loving, substitutionary death motivates Christians world-wide to meet on this day annually to be reassured that the payment for their sins "IS FINISHED!" (John 19:30)

Please take note of the following elements of this special service:

Silence: We ask those attending to observe silence both before and after worship, to allow for quiet contemplation, and out of respect for Christ's suffering. There will be no pre-service or post-service music.

Seven Words: Tonight's service revolves around contemplating Christ's final words spoken from the cross. Pastor Hein will present meditative introductions to each reading.

Noises: Immediately following each reading there will be the sound of pounding metal to represent the nails pounded into Christ's body. The service ends with another loud sound, stone on stone, to represent the closing of Christ's tomb.

Prayers: "The Bidding Prayers" are an ancient set of Christian prayers traditionally spoken on Good Friday, calling worshipers to pray on behalf of others throughout the world. These will follow each reading.

Darkness: Dimmed lighting is used tonight to remind us of the severity of sin and of the darkness that descended at the death of Jesus.

Although tonight's service is very solemn in nature, we do worship joyfully as God's loved and forgiven people. This is not a funeral service for our Lord. We worship in adoration and thanksgiving for the perfect life that Jesus offered as the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

WORSHIP

Please observe silence upon entering worship this evening. This is to allow for quiet contemplation of our Savior's death, and out of respect for his suffering.

The First Word

Luke 23:26-34

"Father, forgive them..."

²⁶ As the soldiers led him away, they seized Simon from Cyrene, who was on his way in from the country, and put the cross on him and made him carry it behind Jesus. ²⁷ A large number of people followed him, including women who mourned and wailed for him. ²⁸ Jesus turned and said to them, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep for yourselves and for

your children.

²⁹ For the time will come when you will say, 'Blessed are the childless women, the wombs that never bore and the breasts that never nursed!'
³⁰ Then "'they will say to the mountains, "Fall on us!" and to the hills, "Cover us!"'

³¹ For if people do these things when the tree is green, what will happen when it is dry?" ³² Two other men, both criminals, were also led out with him to be executed. ³³ When they came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him there, along with the criminals—one on his right, the other on his left. Following each reading throughout the service, you will hear the pounding of steel three times. This represents the pounding of nails into the left hand, right hand, and feet of Jesus when he was crucified.

The Bidding Prayer

The Bidding Prayer is an ancient element of the Service of Seven Words. The pastor bids the congregation to bring prayers to their Savior, not just on behalf of themselves, but on behalf of people throughout the whole world.

Let us pray for the whole Church, that our gracious Father would defend her from the devil and keep her faithful to her Lord.

Almighty and everlasting God, you have revealed your saving name to the world through Jesus Christ our Lord. Protect us from the assaults of the Evil One, and help us remain faithful to your Word, so that in every adversity we may stand firm in our faith and give ourselves fully to our Savior's work, through Christ our Lord.

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?").

When some of those standing there heard this, they said, "He's calling Elijah."

Immediately one of them ran and got a sponge. He filled it with wine vinegar, put it on a staff, and offered it to Jesus to drink. ⁴⁹ The rest said, "Now leave him alone. Let's see if Elijah comes to save him."

The Bidding Prayer

Let us pray that our gracious Father would protect us and our communities from the many earthly calamities that threaten us.

Almighty and everlasting God, on all sides we are surrounded by danger from wars and famine, from disease and pestilence, with the devil begrudging us every minute of our lives. Protect us from all these miseries so that your name may still be glorified in them and so that we may safely pass through them to your heavenly kingdom, through Christ our Lord.

Let us pray for those who are outside the Church, that they may come to know the one true God and Jesus Christ whom he has sent.

Almighty and everlasting God, your Son was lifted up on the cross so that he mighty draw all people to himself. Through the proclamation of your Word, mercifully gather from the nations a people that are your very own, that we may join together around your throne in glory to praise and thank you forever, through Christ our Lord.

With his victory accomplished on the cross and credited to us in Holy Baptism, Christians bid peaceful rest to their Savior as they anticipate their celebration of his glorious resurrection on Easter dawn.



After a moment of silence, a loud sound is made which represents the closing of Christ's tomb. This sound is known as the "strepitus," which is Latin for "noise." Ending Good Friday meditations with this sound is an ancient Christian tradition, a reminder of Christ being sealed in his tomb until Easter.

As we sit in silence and dusk turns to darkness, we contemplate the love Jesus has for each of us, to have died a criminal's death so that we could spend eternity in heaven.

Following the "strepitus," the congregation is asked to disperse in silence. You may also remain for personal prayer and meditation before leaving quietly.
